Our first half term in Year 1 has been a very busy and fun one! We have settled in and are working well on our learning tasks, both inside our classroom and in our refurbished outside area.

The new addition of six laptops in our classroom has been brilliant and we have been enjoying playing a range of phonics and maths games on them to help us learn. Meanwhile, in the outside area we have liked collaborating in small groups to use the giant polydron, sand pit, water tray and a variety of other resources for 'funky fingers' (motor control development) activities and imaginative play.

As part of our 'Weather Wizardry' learning theme, we have been finding out more about the seasons and looking at the information given in weather forecasts. We've even filmed our own weather forecast report bulletins!

In maths, we have been learning about the number line, finding 'one more' and 'one less' than numbers, drawing part-whole models and writing addition number sentences using the '+' and '=' signs. We have also been working really hard to write our numbers the right way round. "I like learning about part-whole models and adding in maths." Georgia

We have already learned several new sounds in our daily phonics lessons and we've spent the last two weeks finding out about split digraphs. Split digraphs are made up of a vowel and a 'magic e'. We have learned that the 'magic e' "makes the other vowel say its name" whilst staying silent itself because it is magic.

We have been focusing on writing sentences, remembering our capital letters, full stops and finger spaces. We have also been trying to use adjectives in our writing, to add description.

So far, we have made natural art sculptures, been on an 'autumn treasures' hunt, whittled wood, learned about different types of trees and their leaves, practised lighting fires, toasted marshmallows on the fire and made squirrel feeders.

In Year 2, we began our year with an exciting trip to Dell Quay! We've been learning about coastlines and their geographical features, and loved getting to see these things up close for ourselves. While we were there, we also went crabbing. Luckily, no one got hurt by their spikey claws!

In Literacy, we've been learning about adjectives and adverbs, and how we can use them to improve our descriptive writing. We used some adjectives in this poem about autumn, after going outside to generate ideas.

Year 3 has got underway with Mrs Potter and Mr Neaves sharing the teaching load - and having a lot of fun with the children!

Highlights from the first term include the children writing a short story and then presenting them to their parents on the Open Afternoon. We looked at how to plan and then structure a story, and the children had a lot of fun making their little books.





In the first week of the term, the children met with our tame History Specialist, Paul Ullson, for a guided tour of Chichester. This was to kickstart their topic for the half term, and it was a lovely day to be touring some of the many historic points in the town.

During the visit, the children sketched different points of interest, and photos were taken too. The photographs were printed out and we have used them to start a class timeline, highlighting the rich history of Noviomagus Reginorum!

On the 10th of October, the children went once again in to Chichester to visit Bishop's Palace Gardens and also Chichester Cathedral.

Following the visit to the beautiful hidden gardens, the children have started writing their own descriptions of a special place.

At the Cathedral, they sketched images of some of the windows, in particular the Chagall window. They were fortunate enough to have somebody who works at the Cathedral talk to them about it too.



In Science, the main learning for the half term has been around Scientific Enquiry. The Association for Science defines this as: "Scientific Enquiry describes the processes and skills pupils should be taught and use, to find out more about the world and how it works."

As our topic for next half term is to be light, we have been doing practical experiments around this topic to develop their skills. This has ranged from testing the properties of different materials to see if they are opaque, transparent or translucent to making predictions about what will happen to our shadows over the course of a day.

This practical, hands-on approach to the learning has proven to be very popular, if frustrating at times. The children were finally able to get outside at 3pm on a Thursday to draw around each other's shadow as it was cast on the playground, having had to wait almost all day for the clouds to part enough to do this. When they came in the next morning and stood in the same spot and looked at their shadows in comparison to the chalk outline from the day before, they were stunned to see their new shadow was at almost 90 degrees to it - and longer! As the day went on, they kept going outside to see their shadows "moving" as they got closed to the chalk outline drawn the day before.

They showed great resilience in capturing this information before trying to explain why this is.











This term, we have been doing some fun things in Year 4! In art, we have made colour wheels using primary colours to make secondary colours and then mixing both to make tertiary colours. Ten house points was the prize for getting the wheels correct!

We designed a picture of our world now and in the future and we painted it with hot and cool colours. We have learnt that our earth is getting hotter and this has an impact on the animals and plants that live in different climates across the world.

We have also been making leaf posters and keys to help us identify the trees in our school grounds. We have also been pond dipping and we caught baby newts, leaches and nymphs. We looked at how the newt and the lily were adapted to living in the pond.

The author Tim Tilley gave us all a book which we are reading in class. We drew story maps in the hall to show our ideas.

In PE we have been playing netball. We are looking forward to the inter-house competition this week.


Curling



Brimming with ideas and passion, Keisha's determined to stamp down injustices and stand up for what she believes.




