We have really enjoyed learning about three significant people in History Florence Nightingale, Mary Seacole and Edith Cavell. We have compared their lives as nurses and used a timeline to know when they were alive and who they helped. Some of the children explained, "Mary Seacole and Florence Nightingale both looked after soldiers during the Crimean war." But both looked after the soldiers very differently, the children added, highlighting that "Florence Nightingale visited them at night with her lamp" while, "Mary Seacole grinded up herbs in a pestle and mortar." The class experienced what it would be like during the life of Edith Cavell in WW1, and when they heard the air raid signal, they found somewhere in the classroom to get cover.

Science-Taste testing

In science, we all participated in a tasting experiment to see how our tongue tastes bitter, sour, salty and sweet flavours. The children were given a piece of bread and then they had to taste different flavours one at a time. They had to identify whether they thought it tasted bitter, sweet, sour or salty and then they had to colour in a picture to indicate whether they liked the flavour or not. I saw a lot of funny face being pulled, but I was so proud to see all the children take part, even though they didn't know what hey were tasting.

During Maths, the children have been learning lots of multiplication and division skills. They have also been introduced to arrays. Ask your child to tell you all about them, as you can even see arrays in a bar of chocolate! Through learning the song 'Row, Row, Row Your Boat' the children know that rows go from side to side, and they also now know that columns go up and down as they think about columns holding a temple up.

During R.E., the children watched the bible parable 'The Good Samaritan.' Together through discussion, the children understood what it means to be a Samaritan and they were surprised to know that there is even a charity called the Samaritans today. The children had the opportunity to act out the story, and they all played their parts and characters well.


In art we used bright colours and painted a flower head in the style of Van Gogh.

We walked back to the accommodation to relax before dinner, and then played outside before collapsing in front of a film in the bar area!



R.E AT JYS

In this edition of IYS magazine, the subject focus is Religious Education.

At JYS, our Religious Education (R.E.) curriculum is designed to help pupils learn the skills that will enable them to develop the fundamental British Value of having mutual respect and tolerance of those with different faiths and beliefs.

The children themselves recognise the importance and benefit of learning about different faiths, religions and traditions:

"I would like to learn even more. It helps with our friendships and when we meet new people, so we can understand them."

"It's important that we get taught R.E. so you don't get 'closed off' just because your family believes one thing."

Curriculum design:

The children begin learning R.E. in Year R, when they listen to, discuss, and ask questions about stories from a variety of religions and worldviews. They are introduced to subject specific vocabulary and are encouraged to ask questions and to reflect on their own feelings and experiences.

As they move through the school, the children have the opportunity to learn about the defining beliefs, concepts, symbols and teachings of different religions, and to find out about secular worldviews, such as Humanism. The religions studied are: Christianity, Judaism, Islam, Hinduism, Sikhism and Buddhism.

Our curriculum is designed around 'themes', which allow the children to learn about, and re-visit, different religions and secular worldviews on a regular basis as they move through the school. This enables the children to draw on prior knowledge as they develop and deepen their understanding. Our curriculum is also designed to help the children organise their learning around key concepts (such as 'symbols', 'food', 'celebrations' and 'special books') so that it becomes more meaningful and so that they can compare and contrast different religions more easily.

What happens in an R.E. lesson?

Teachers use a range of resources and activities to make R.E. lessons fun, engaging and meaningful. These include using practical activities such as partner work, drama and group / class discussions; showing religious artefacts; tasting foods from particular special meals and festivals; showing video clips, which the children like because, "you can see what's happening as well as being told about it by your teacher." Children are also given opportunities to respond and reflect on their learning in different ways, including through art.

R.E. Visits and Visitors

It really helps to bring the children's learning to life when they are able to gain 'face-to-face' experiences of religion. We are very lucky that the children in Year 1 are able to have a tour around St. Paul's Church as part of their 'Places of Worship' unit, whilst the children in Year 3 visit Chichester Cathedral when they study The Piper Tapestry. Last November, Year 5 and Year 6 were able to visit the LIFE Exhibition at Swanfield Chapel, to find out more about the life of Jesus Christ and to learn why Christians believe he is so special.

The children always really enjoy getting involved in these 'audience participation' performances!

The children in both year groups asked some really thoughtful questions about Sikhism and learned lots from Divinder, during her visit. She talked about her Dastar (turban), which she explained is "part of her Sikh uniform", just like our JYS jumpers and cardigans show everyone that we belong to the Jessie Younghusband school family. She also taught the children about Simran, the act of 'repeating God's name in remembrance', which Sikhs do to be still and to quieten their minds. After the session, some of the Year 5 children commented on "what a calm and peaceful religion Sikhism is."

What do I need to know about ChatGPT?



ChatGPT

A guide for parents and carers

Launched on 30th November 2022, ChatGPT is an artificial intelligence chatbot which can be found online. Similarly to a robotic customer service often found on the corner of a website or app, ChatGPT generates content and answers based on a user's question.

What is Artificial Intelligence (AI)?

We're coming up to a quarter of the way through the 21st century, and AI is all around us, even if we may not realise it.

Every time you open your phone with Face ID, click on a personalised advert online, or ask your device about the weather – you are engaging with and receiving information from Al.

Over the years, Al has becomes smarter in terms of listening, learning, and solving problems – all while drawing on a massive database of information.

How do I use ChatGPT?

ChatGPT is hosted online, it is available as both a desktop application and can be accessed on a web browser.

There is no set minimum age restriction for using ChatGPT, but it requires you to sign in with an email address and to accept the site terms and conditions before you begin using it.

On ChatGPT you can type in a question or topic that you'd like to learn more about. For example, you could ask "What is the tallest mountain in the world?"

You can have multiple ongoing conversations which you can revisit, and ChatGPT uses information you have given it in the chat to tailor each answer it gives. This is different to other chat bots where answers are limited to each question rather than the chain of questions and information as a whole.

ChatGPT gets its data from a variety of sources on the internet, such as websites, books, and other documents.

Safety considerations about ChatGPT Inappropriate content

If you are considering using ChatGPT with young people it is important to note that some conversations may not be appropriate for young people.

At Childnet we recommend having a conversation with your child about the use of any new apps, website or services, this can include discussing@he content they may come across and the strategies they can use if something or someone worries or upsets them online.

By maintaining an open dialogue with your child and encouraging them to talk to you about their internet use, you can help them to access the amazing resources the internet has to offer whilst keeping them safe online.

You may decide to monitor your child's interactions with ChatGPT depending on their age, or suggest only using the service whilst you are together as a family. There are also <u>parental controls</u> you can enable if you would rather your child not be interacting with it.

You could also create a <u>family agreement</u> to outline key decisions such as who can use ChatGPT, where in the house this can be accessed and what kind of questions your child can ask.

However, in a twist of fate, the school that came first was subsequently disqualified for not having the correct ratio of children, and so we been placed first - and the children are going through to a county final!

Squash - Chichester Racquet and Health Club (25/03/23)

Five of our Year 6s were invited back to Chichester Racquets and Fitness Club to compete against three other schools in activities that challenged them to use their growing squash skills.

The children were numbered and then had 90 seconds to see how many times they could do a forehand drive against the wall without stopping, then backhand. They were then set the challenge to see how many serves they could get in from the right hand side of the court, and then the left. The last challenge was the continuous rally, with all of the children having to participate.

After a short break, the children then competed in short 4-minute squash games against the pupils from North Mundham, Parklands and Westbourne Primary. We are delighted to have been awarded 3rd place.







For ages 6-8 and up Leila, the Perfect Witch (The World of Gustavo)
